

THE RICHMOND TROPHY

It may be of interest to many to have a few notes on the "Trophy" and the famous skaters who have won it.

The Trophy itself is a handsome piece of craftmanship standing some 30 inches high and was presented to encourage the friendly competition between skaters of all nations—affiliated to the I.S.U. and was first competed for in 1949 when it was won by that famous British skater, Miss Jeanette Altwegg, who incidentally won it the following year, and eventually won an Olympic Gold Medal in 1952.

Following her in 1951—Miss Barbara Wyatt won this much coveted event, and represented Great Britain in many International Championships. The next year found a younger skater of astounding ability making her mark in the Skating World—Miss Yvonne Sugden who also won it again in 1953 and 1955; and whilst not wishing to detract from the brilliant winner of the 1954 Competition, would mention that Yvonne was compelled to withdraw from that year's event after trying out her injured leg on the morning of the event.

The 1954 winner was that talented young lady, Miss Patricia Pauley, who is competing this evening and has, despite her youth, skated all over Europe in numerous International events.

THE TOMLINSON TROPHY

This Trophy, a handsome Silver Rose Bowl, was donated to the R.A.I.S.C. by W. R. Tomlinson, Esq., himself a very fine and keen dancer on ice and a former Vice-President of the Club.

This event has attracted pairs from all over England, and when it is realised that Great Britain has for a long time been the leading country in this branch—British skaters occupied the first three places in last season's World's Championships—you should see some very fine skating to-night.

We are however, pleased to welcome one couple from the Continent — The Italian Champions.

THE RICHMOND TROPHY

Abstract of Rules

The competitors must be amateurs who have never won the World or European Championship or Olympic Competition, who are members of an Association or Special Club, member of the I.S.U.

The prizes consist of "The Richmond Trophy" (which will be held by the winner for one year, but remains in the custody of the Organising Club), a souvenir replica being awarded to the winner for possession, prizes of honour to the second and third.

The competition shall consist of two sections:-

- (a) Compulsory figures not to exceed six in number.
- (b) Free skating-four minutes duration.



SKATING and INSTRUCTION

skaters from all parts of the world, achieving many National and World successes; and whilst Great Britain achieved no Gold Medal in the last Olympics at Cortina, Mr. Gerschwiler brought certain credit to himself and this rink in particular by training the winning pair skaters at Cortina and securing a further success in obtaining 3rd place in the Ladies' event with one of his pupils. He, together with every member of the teaching staff, operate our *Children's Classes* every Saturday morning and over the past few years have achieved remarkable success with several thousand children.

Ice Dancing, a branch in which everybody may achieve success or at least proficiency to a degree of satisfaction and enjoyment beyond "just skating," is catered for by a highly trained staff of teachers.

To many, the holding of any contest is just another event, but with International events there is much effort on the part of the entrants and their teachers without whom no event would be possible.
