TONIGHT'S EVENTS

Primarily, this evening is now talked of as "Trophy" night and has become one of the major competitions of Figure Skating, but do not let us forget the supporting event for the Tomlinson Trophy, which, like the Richmond Trophy, attracts some of the finest skaters in friendly competition.

The RICHMOND TROPHY is being competed for, for the ninth occasion, when many fine skaters will be participating, some of whom are on the verge of becoming famous, not only in Europe but throughout the world, like some of the previous "Trophy" winners, particularly Jeanette Altwegg and Yvonne Sugden. Who today's winner will be is very speculative as the Competition is divided into two parts—figures and free, and a position at the end of the figures—skated during the day whereby there is a very close standing in marks, would leave the ultimate result very open, a state of things which adds considerably to the interest this evening.

We are pleased to welcome this evening skaters from the Continent in addition to our own British representation.



The **TOMLINSON TROPHY**, donated to the Richmond Amateur Ice Skating Club by a former Vice-President to encourage Ice Dancing, particularly that known as "The Blues," a very attractive dance, especially when well skated.

Tonight's entry includes many fine pairs—here again the result remains an open affair.

Previous winners include the World Champions (Miss June Markham and Mr. Courtney Jones of Great Britain) and Miss B. J. Thompson and Mr. C. Rigby (British representatives in World Championships).

THE RICHMOND TROPHY

Abstract of Rules

The competitors must be amateurs who have never won the World or European Championship or Olympic Competition, who are members of an Association or Special Club, member of the I.S.U.

The prizes consist of "The Richmond Trophy" (which will be held by the winner for one year, but remains in the custody of the Organising Club), a souvenir replica being awarded to the winner for possession, prizes of honour to the second and third.

The competition shall consist of two sections:-

- (a) Compulsory figures not to exceed six in number.
- (b) Free skating—four minutes duration.




No doubt many of us will meet again in some other country.

for HEALTH & RECREATION & CAREER

At the time of going to press we are in the midst of an epidemic of "flu"—whether it be Asian or just the good old English variety is debatable.

Certainly none of our competitors come that far to cause us any anxiety.

On such occasions the public warning is to keep away from hot and stuffy, crowded places. WHAT AN ADVERT FOR ICE SKATING! How fortunate are we to come outside this category, for however crowded an ice rink be, it can never be called "hot and stuffy." With some hundreds of tons of ice covering approximately 80 per cent of the floor there is always that crisp air which even a non-skater enjoys on the first signs of a severe frost, so to the non-skater we do urge you to become skating-minded, both for yourself and family.

Whilst most people are covered by National Insurance, few wish to be ill to obtain "value for money." We build ourselves up in the summer at considerable expense, so why not retain that condition throughout the winter months at a small cost by healthy recreation.

You cannot skate? The same outlook applies to most things, but, starting the right way, one soon masters any preconceived ideas of difficulty. Many skaters have never had assistance. We can only recommend instruction as a short cut to gaining confidence and ultimate pleasure.

Our Children's Classes, under the able control of our Senior Instructor, Arnold Gerschwiler, assisted by all the rest of our teaching staff, have created and given health and pleasure to thousands of children, some of whom have even graduated to Championship class.

For parents or those beyond school-leaving age **Adult Classes** are held in conjunction with the Central Council of Physical Recreation, whereby our staff carry on with those who probably never lived near ICE.

As a career, throughout the country many are earning a very good living either teaching or performing on ice, whilst some go further afield to the Colonies and America, and, as the Services say, "see the world at the expense of others." This is even true of some who started in our Children's Classes.

Our teaching staff are specially chosen, not only for their skating ability, but for their personality, whereby child or adult is made to feel that skating can be a pleasure—and the participation in things with those who share a mutual interest soon promotes further friendships.

"RICHMOND," not only the home of skating, but where skaters feel "at home," not only because there is everything one wants but all one's wants are not only catered for but studied, both as regards skating and leisure hours. This season, owing to the great demand for ICE DANCE time, we have introduced approximately 45 minutes each MONDAY, WEDNESDAY and THURSDAY and to the exclusion of HOCKEY SKATES.

THE CHURCHILL SUITE—a

recent addition to our facilities, not quite so large as the "Arosa" Room and of a different style of decoration, but nevertheless of instant appeal. Private dinners, receptions and any other function for a moderate sized party where an intimate atmosphere is demanded.
