# The Richmond Trophy

We feel that each year, with the ever increasing interest in Ice Skating, that there are many to whom the "Richmond Trophy" is symbolic of a competition which arouses considerable attention both in England, Continental Europe and even further afield, but the actual institution of same has never aroused a thought, so perhaps a few notes would be appreciated.

'Richmond' is and always has been primarily a SKATING rink, where people can come and skate throughout the year, Summer and Winter, except the odd occasions, e.g., Good Friday and Christmas and as such, facilities to develop and encourage skating have been created for teaching tiny tots and all ages up to—WELL!

Perhaps we'd better leave the age open, suffice it to say that we've had skaters here of 90 years of age!!

It was as the result of our interest in skating and a desire to encourage same at a difficult period, that this Trophy came into being; the first thought being to maintain an interest to many promising British skaters thwarted by Wartime conditions.

The end of the war coming whilst details were being formulated but not concluded, turned out to be a blessing in more ways than one, enabling a much greater scope for competition, resulting in the prestige in which it is held today.

The first event attracted fourteen competitors from six different countries whilst more recent events have attracted some 20 skaters from seven to nine countries as far apart as Poland and the U.S.A.

At the time of going to press the entry is unknown but we feel we shall not be disappointed in the entry and the countries represented and that those appearing will not only give pleasure to the public, but progress to greater honours; in any case we shall watch their progress with interest.

## PLACES OF INTEREST

On Such an occasion as this we know there are many whose first visit it is, whether English or Continental, and whilst time may not permit on this occasion, a few notes may be of interest should a return to the district provide those extra hours. Many of these programmes will find their way to Continental countries and those contemplating a skating trip—and there are many—would no doubt appreciate what is within a reasonable distance if not in the immediate vicinity.

London itself is only nine miles to the centre and details of what that has to offer needs a Baedeker. Kew Gardens, Hampton Court, Richmond Park, Richmond Horse Show, Henley (rowing), Windsor Castle and Park are places of appeal, not only to the continental, but the English public—and these all within easy reach of Richmond.

## THE RICHMOND TROPHY

#### Abstract of Rules

The competitors must be amateurs who have never won the World or European Championship or Olympic Competition, who are members of an Association or Special Club, member of the I.S.U.

The prizes consist of "The Richmond Trophy" (which will be held by the winner for one year, but remains in the custody of the Organising Club), a souvenir replica being awarded to the winner for possession, prizes of honour to the second and third.

The competition shall consist of two sections: -

- (a) Compulsory figures not to exceed five in number.
- (b) Free skating-four minutes duration.

# Looking Backward



Looking Forward

Whilst the above is Coat of Arms of our local Borough at present, we can not envisage under any future merging of boroughs, one which has a more apt motto, either for a Borough or a business, especially one such as ours.

To us the activities of our public are most important and also of interest, both as regards our skaters of the past, their successes and present occupations and whereabouts; likewise those who have more recently brought honour to "Richmond" by their own achievements, give us a further interest of even greater honour and success.

The holding of the "Richmond" Trophy competition virtually opens each Winter Skating Season, being the first major event to be held; this year it heralds the approach of an Olympic year, and whilst we have hopes of a local trained skater to take the Ladies title—Miss Sjoukje Dijkstra—of Holland, we shall naturally follow the progress of all tonight's competitors, some of whom may also be participating in the Olympics early in 1964.

Should such success come the way of Miss Dijkstra we can be sure that one person will be more than happy—Mr. Gerschwiler—who has devoted a great deal of attention to the present World Champion and achievement is some satisfaction to both pupil and teacher.

Such Olympic success would not be an isolated event for Mr. Gerschwiler as, over the years, pupils have achieved untold honours in National, European and World events besides Olympic Winter Games.

Traditionally, Leap Year coming once in four, is a Ladies opportunity—may this be Sjoukje's, at least as regards Skating honours.

Looking forward is to a certain extent tied up with the present, for it is with the present one thinks and speculates as to the possibilities of promising skaters, who can tell what the future holds at a glance—at least one member, a product of our Children's Classes, achieved world success; others, honours of varying degrees.

'Tis very much like walking through Windsor and speculating as to which of the little Eton boys will eventually be Prime Minister (or even War Minister).

Whatever the outcome we feel sure our younger skaters are keen and enthusiastic and whilst skating success may not be achieved we are confident their health, physical and mental capacity will have benefitted as the result of a healthy recreation.

# Skating To-day

In compiling this programme we feel there are many—young, middle aged and elderly, whose association or interest is limited, probably due to residence, self-consciousness or lack of facilities.

No doubt last winter did provide greater natural opportunities but the regular skater will always return to haunts he knows, where the surface is better and regularly available, combined with the fact that all or most of one's wants are catered for, e.g., Social atmosphere, refreshments, including licensed bars and for his use equipment and furthermore advice in respect of maintenance.

There are few, if any, Rinks where the management have been associated longer than at 'Richmond'.

Similarly, many of the staff have also been associated with Skating for something like 20 years, so we pride ourselves that at least we know something about skating and also the requirements of a skater, both as regards teaching and the essentials—Boots and Skates.

We not only have produced champions but have produced, from small children upwards, many thousands of skaters, who, if they've never achieved fame have probably achieved a fine healthy constitution and mental outlook contributing to longer life and a more fertile brain to cope with the daily problems of business.

Today there is every opportunity for everybody to learn.

Children's Classes, Adult Classes and private Instruction from highly qualified teachers. It is no accident that brings skaters to 'Richmond' from all over England and the Continent to improve their skating, whether it be as a soloist, pair or dance couple.

One continually finds things in life synonymous, and so with Skating, viz., Boots and Skates.

These are on sale at many shops, but what is the experience generally in any shop? One must give some credit for experience and we are fortunate to still have with us a man who has been fitting boots and skates approximately 30 years—Mr. D. J. Vickers and who has made friends with nearly every leading skater, amateur and professional over this period.

By purchasing at a Rink Shop one not only has experienced staff, but the opportunity of "trying out" on the spot. Furthermore should some slight adjustment be necessary it can be done almost immediately.

Regrinding of skates—at reasonable charges; but please do not ask for a "while you wait" service, they don't lose their edges at home.






# To Our Visitors Competitors and Officials

# Curling at Richmond

Every Tuesday evening throughout the Winter season from September to April the sound of "soop," "soop" is in the air almost drowning the roar of the stones as they sail up the rink to the "head." It is the "Province of London" members indulging in Scotland's national game. With very limited ice time, for Richmond is famous for its skaters, it is always enjoyable to watch curling on Tuesdays for with the development and evolution of modern curling there has come a natural desire to understand and master the basic principles and mechanics of the game. Curling is controlled by the Royal Caledonian Curling Club of which H.R.H. The Prince Philip is President-Elect—and it is hoped that the International Game between Scotland and England will be staged once again in 1964 at Richmond.

A new club, "London Watsonians," has been added to the six clubs in the "Province," and competition is very keen, especially for the lovely "Fleming Trophy" which was presented in memory of Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of penicillin, who was himself a keen curler.

Ice fees include the use of a pair of Stones which weigh approximately 40 lbs. each.

Membership is rather limited because of playing time, but any person interested in this wonderful game is invited to contact Ronald Alpe, Hon. Secretary of the Province, at the rink either by letter or phone. Brochures are available at the office.
